Research Laboratories "Open Days"



Leonard Michael Harris, B. Sc., F.A.D.G. Planning and Research

It is not unusual in an organisation as large as the Australian Post Office for many officers to be in the position of knowing their Divisional Head in name only, yet never having the opportunity of seeing him "in the flesh". This is not the case, however, for the majority of members of the Research Laboratories.

Mr. Harris commenced with the Department as a Cadet Engineer in June 1926. After graduating as Bachelor of Science in Physics at the University of Melbourne, he joined the Research Laboratories to work in the field of line communications. Except for a break of six years (1955 - 1961) on long line equipment work, he remained with the Laboratories, taking charge of its operations in 1961. In 1964, he was promoted to the position of First Assistant Director-General, Planning and Research, which position he still holds.

Mr. Harris has led delegations to C.C.I.F. and C.C.I.T.T. Conferences and also attended the Commonwealth Conference on Satellite Communications held in London in 1962. In 1963 he led a delegation to the Extraordinary Administrative Radio Conference on Frequency Allocation for Space Systems and Radio Astronomy held in Geneva by the International Telecommunications Union.

To most of us "L.M.H." is a familiar figure but these days, unfortunately, due to heavy commitments, his visits from the Ivory Tower are restricted to official tours or farewell functions for old colleagues.

Presentation to Lord Casey

To mark the occasion of his visit to the Laboratories last August, the following letter was sent to Lord Casey by the Director-General:-

"In August of last year, you visited my Department for the express purpose of inspecting the Departmental Research Laboratories.

The occasion was one of considerable significance and honour for the Department as a whole and especially so for the people in our Laboratories whose work you inspected. Their pleasure at the visit, and the stimulation they received from it, was further supplemented by the interest and professional understanding which you displayed in our research activities.

Naturally enough the visit was referred to in the Post Office Annual Report for 1967/68. I would like you to accept a souvenir copy of the Report, and specimens of the stamps featured on its cover, together with an album of photographs recording your tour through the Laboratories.

It is our hope that these mementoes will bring to mind in the future one of the small, and we trust, pleasant episodes in your distinguished service as Governor-General."

Overseas


EPILOGUE:



The Victorian Division of the Australian Postal Institute has established a Lapidary Club and is inviting members who are prepared to join in this popular, rewarding and interesting hobby


The Club offers a well equipped work room, instructive lectures, regular outings to various gemstone localities and an up-to-date library.

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2. A Miller-gram
