PARKING FACILITIES AT OUR PLANNED NEW BUILDINGS

In a recent editorial of the "Research Lab. Reporter", you were advised of our plans to relocate the Laboratories at South Melbourne and Monash by about 1975. You were also invited to offer any suggestions for inclusion in our considerations of the project requirements.

A number of notes were submitted for consideration and mostly, they were concerned with on-site parking facilities for staff use at the sites.


Clearly, open air paved car parks will be available (and necessary) at the 172 acre Monash site. The cost per car of such a facility is about \$350 and our brief requested the provision of on-site parking for about one car per three staff in this more remote location. With "car clubs" operating as can be expected, this will probably be an adequate provision, and we will be able to gauge this adequacy in the early stages of occupation, when the site is not fully developed.

The South Melbourne site, with its restricted area of $2\frac{5}{4}$ acres presents a more difficult problem in this regard. The M.M.B.W. Planning Scheme Ordinance requires that one car space be provided for each 1000 sq. ft. of office space or for each 1500 sq. ft. of laboratory space. From the Department of Works feasibility studies to date, this gives a requirement (to 1995) for 450 - 500 cars, or for one car space to every 4 - 5 estimated staff. However, the site would require that this facility be provided in basement car parks at an approximate cost of \$3,400 per car. The Department is not obliged to comply with the M.M.B.W. requirement but would attempt to come as close to it as is economically possible. From recent discussions with the Department of Works, it would seem likely that an eventual provision of 300 - 350 car spaces (for an estimated 2000 staff in 1995) is about the limit of the capacity of one bacement over the whole site, and that

one basement is the practical limit on space available for car parking facilities in a total of two basements economically practicable on this site.

The policy of the Department on the provision of staff car parks is to make them economically viable propositions. So, be warned, users will be expected to pay an appropriate fee to cover the interest on the capital costs of providing the car parking facilities.


The matter of car parking for staff, amongst other aspects of the project, has not been finally resolved as yet - pending further feasibility studies by the Department of Works. However, it is hoped that this outline of current thinking will allay the fears of those who have expressed them.


