Well, this is what the President of Pennsylvania State University said in a speech to the graduating class of 1969. Asking them to look around at the "oldies" in the room he went on to say:-

"These, your parents and grandparents, are the people who within just five decades - 1919-1969 - have by their work, increased your life expectancy by approximately 50% - who, while cutting the working day by a third, have more than doubled per capita output. And the dreaded polio is no longer a medical factor, while T.B. is almost unheard of.

Let me remind you that these remarkable people lived through history's greatest depression. Many of these people know what it was to be poor, what it is to be hungry and cold. And because of this they determined that it would not happen to you, that you would have a better life, you would have food to eat, milk to drink, vitamins to nourish you, a warm home, better schools and greater opportunities to succeed than they had. Because of them you will work fewer hours, learn more, have more leisure time, travel to more distant places and have more of a chance to follow your life's ambitions. They are also the people who defeated the tyranny of Hitler, and who, when it was all over, had the compassion to spend billions of dollars to help their former enemies rebuild their homelands. And these are the people who had the sense to begin the United Nations. It was their representatives who built thousands of high schools, trained and hired thousands of better teachers and made higher education a very real possibility for millions of youngsters - where once it was only the dream of a wealthy few.

They, these two generations, made more progress by the sweat of their brow than any other people in any other era. If your generation can make as much progress in as many areas you should be able to solve a good many of the world's remaining ills. But it won't be easy. And you won't do it by negative thoughts, nor by tearing down or belittling."

For those of you who have not visited this outpost of scientific advancement, from the outside it resembles the North Fitzroy Post Office and the inside resembles an old aeroplane hangar.




